The Plans! The Plans!

There are two major Plans that we need your help with this year - we'll be running consultation on both of them during April.

The Long Term Plan, (or LTP) is essentially our 10 year budget, while the District Plan Review is all about updating the rulebook for land use in Waitaki. It's super important we get both of these right, and that you are happy with the final versions too.

YOU DON'T NEED A FLUX CAPACITOR...

... to help make Waitaki's future better, just get involved with our Long term Plan consultation.

Things got a bit derailed for everyone last year but now we're totally back into the really important job of planning for Waitaki's future. The Long Term Plan looks at levels and costs of Council services plus the big ticket spending items that we may or may not include in our budget for the next ten years. It's a balancing act between service realities, community needs and aspirations, and the community's willingness to pay.

Tell us what you think. A rates increase, a proposed sports centre, how we should be facing climate change, recovering from COVID, minimising waste... there's a lot to consider when it comes to thinking about the next 10 years and we need your help getting it right. Public consultation will start towards the end of April.





DISTRICT PLAN REVIEW UPDATE

Early engagement with affected landowners has begun, with updated maps produced which adhere to new rules set out by government that increase the level of protection for:

- Native plant and animal habitats (Significant Natural Areas)
- Natural landscape features (Outstanding and Significant Natural Features)
- Landscapes of value inland and coastal (Outstanding Natural Landscapes)
- Sites and areas of significance to Māori (Wāhi Tūpuna)

The early engagement is designed as a heads-up to landowners that are most affected by these new overlays, and a fact checking exercise for Council's mapping systems. Each of these targeted landowners will receive a letter, a booklet of factsheets, and a map of their property showing where the overlays fall. We now wait for feedback and a chance to have a chat about any concerns, either face-to-face or via a special hotline that has been set up.

NB: Not everyone will be getting a letter, and it's far from the last opportunity that landowners will have to make sure they're heard!

NEXT STEP:

Public meetings are being planned for communities in coastal areas.



...AND ANOTHER THING

Tell us what you think about changes to our Development Contributions Policy and to our Policy on Revenue and Financing.

The purpose of the Development Contribution Policy is to set out how council proposes to calculate and levy development contributions. We are reviewing our policy in line with the LTP as we have to do every 3 years. There are minor changes to the policy following a more thorough review in 2018. Stakeholders including developers, builders, architects, lawyers and surveyors are the folks likely to be affected by these minor changes. You'll be able to have your say on these changes when the consultation opens later in the month. More details to come.
