


MAY we interest you in reading the LINK THIS MONTH?

Meet Jim Thomson - Councillor for Waihemo.

Brand new Councillor Jim Thomson might be a large bloke, bearing more than a passing resemblance to the Clydesdales he breeds, but carpets need not fear his cloppers. "I'll just go round the back and take my boots off," he says, "I'm more afraid of Mrs Thomson than I am of anything else."

The Thomsons have 181 hectares just outside Palmerston, farming sheep and beef. "Unfortunately, I can't hide as many Clydesdales as I'd like," he says. He's keeping it to 10 for now, bred under the Waihemo stud. This is a pretty big space to hide a Clydesdale in though, the wide expanse criss-crossed by the river's course over eons. Carrying a load of hay over, the horses rush to see him, high stepping, the ponies kicking a can-can.


Clydesdales are the workhorses of New Zealand, they cleared this country and broke it in. A 'Scottish heavy horse' is designed to pull large loads: they are an irresistible force looking for an immovable object. Jim too is a bit of a plough. Honest, forthright, "I'll probably offend more people than I intend to," he warns, but his heart's in the right place.

"If you don't agree with how your telco does things, you can change companies... when you have a run-in with Council there's nowhere else to go... the thing is to improve the way things are done so people don't leave with a bad taste in their mouths." A lengthy political career isn't a life goal. "I don't care if I don't get re-elected. At the moment I'm the new boy, my job is to listen and learn, but my personality type is to see what needs doing and get it done."

Jim loves Waihemo. "It's real New Zealand", he says. And real is exactly what you can expect from him.

Cheque it OUT!

We're phasing out cheque payments at Council.

As New Zealand banks continue to phase out the use of cheques,

Waitaki District Council will no longer be processing incoming or outgoing cheques after 28 May 2021. Council's cut-off date will allow time to make sure all cheques received are processed ahead of the banks' deadlines.

We are working to ensure the elimination of cheques as a payment option does not impact access to any of the services we provide.

If you currently make any payments to Waitaki District Council by cheque, you will need to start using other forms of payment. Other payment options include:

- Direct debit payments (fortnightly, monthly, or quarterly)
- Electronic payment via internet banking
- Automatic payment via your bankPhone banking / bill pay
- Credit / debit card (credit card fees apply)
- · Cash or Eftpos.

If you are unsure of how to proceed, the first thing to do is to contact your bank and let them know you are going to need some assistance.

Waitaki District Libraries are also running a 'Stepping Up' programme which includes digital literacy classes that can offer support during the transition period as cheques are being phased out. If you wish to enquire about this service, please contact the libraries directly on 03 433 0850.

DISTRICT PLAN REVIEW UPDATE

We have completed sending out landowner engagement letters about Significant Natural Areas, Outstanding and Significant Natural Features, Outstanding Natural Landscapes, and Wāhi Tūpuna to newly-affected landowners in the district.

If you have received a letter from us, you have until 21 May to get your feedback to us – please note, this is not a formal round of submissions, it is just starting a two-way conversation with landowners about the values on their property.

We've also held several public meetings regarding Natural and Coastal Hazards and the Kakanui Spatial Plan.

All of Waitaki will be notified when the Draft plan goes out and at that point we will start welcoming feedback from the wider public.

WHAT? MORE CONSULTATIONS?

Are you in the building industry, a property developer, lawyer or just looking to build?

Changes to Council's policy on Development Contributions and Financial Contributions policy may affect you! We think these changes will make things fairer - but what do YOU think? Tell us before 12 noon, 21 May.

Some key changes to the 2021 Policy on Development Contributions and Financial Contributions are:

- Removal of 50% remission on roading development contributions for residential developments.
- A new model to incentivise residential developments of two or more units on a single site, of less than 80m² per unit.
- Council may seek to recover all reasonable costs incurred in debt recovery proceedings and interest on the outstanding development contributions.
- Council may require a fee for considering a request for reconsideration.
- Council will require a deposit prior to responding to an objection to development contributions.

...BUT WAIT, THERE'S MORE

Our Revenue and Financing Policy is also under review (just when you thought it couldn't get more exciting)!

Council is consulting on a number of changes to the funding mix and rating tools used to fund some of the activities it undertakes. Although the overall impact of the proposed changes are minor, it will have a larger impact on some ratepayers.
