

RELIGHTING LIGHTS LIT by LIONS





Happily, new lighting technology means we can bring this community gift back to life and once again celebrate the tree lined boulevard in its full glory. We will be putting new ground lights in the existing boxes to avoid any unnecessary exposure to the tree's roots. The new lights will have a warm white light and Network Waitaki will start installing these this month.



DID YOU KNOW? We'll be using this spot in the Waitaki Link to answer some questions that came up in our recent Resident's Satisfaction Survey.

1. Why don't we seal more unsealed roads?

Sealing a gravel road costs \$140,000 to \$160.000 per kilometre if the road is strong enough and wide enough for a sealed road. If the gravel road needs to be strengthened and constructed for seal, it will cost \$400,000 to \$450,000 per km! An unsealed road costs roughly \$1,500 per km per year to maintain. A sealed road costs 3 times as much, or \$4,500 per km per year, to maintain.

We will only commit to this expense where the traffic volumes support this investment benefiting the community and if we can attract subsidies (57%) from Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) to offset the cost of reconstructing, sealing and maintaining the new sealed road. This subsidy depends on a number of factors including traffic volumes, the variety of traffic, significance of the route and how many people live along it.
